OVERVIEW AND THEME

Shaping AI and Emerging Technologies to Empower Learning Communities

The CIRCLS'23 theme, "Shaping AI and Emerging Technologies to Empower Learning Communities" calls for attendees to prioritize educational goals and values as we design and investigate AI and other emerging technologies. The theme builds on the prior <u>CIRCLS'21</u> theme of "remaking broadening" and our shared aspiration to move beyond "broadening" to "empowering" learning, teachers, and learning community partners. This theme recognizes the broad surge in AI and emerging technology capabilities. We see a shift from a rapid technology proliferation perspective to instead a considerate and thoughtful design process that strives for equity by enabling teachers and learners to shape their own experiences. We seek to build on greater public awareness of generative AI. And yet, when we play with the letters "AI," we realize there is so much more to center in our conversations. As attendees share their research and collectively prioritize future explorations and investigations, our theme envisions a future where learning communities are empowered by ethical technologies grounded in sound, inclusive principles and strong partnerships.

Participants are welcome to bring explorations and investigations to the convening that reflect the breadth of research in our community and the RETTL Program. CIRCLS has a history of highly interactive, engaging, informative, and thought-provoking discussions through panels, roundtables, and expertise connections.



We anticipate addressing the following topics in the convening:

- Emerging Technologies such as Machine Learning, Generative AI, Augmented Reality, Assistive Technologies and more
- Advances in Learning Sciences Methods and Theories
- Equity, Ethics and related design concepts (responsible or human-centered design)
- Insights on improving learning in specific STEM and broader subjects.
- Research in educational settings for learning in formal educational institutions and informal settings like museums

Local Attractions

African American Heritage Trail

The African American Heritage Trails comprise interconnecting routes in the City of Alexandria. Together, these trails illuminate the history of the African American community over a span of several centuries. The Trails currently have two routes along the Waterfront. The African American Heritage Trail Committee created this walking tour through history, with the support of the Office of Historic Alexandria.

Alexandria Archaeology Museum

Visit the Alexandria Archaeology Museum to learn how the City's archaeologists, volunteers and students work with residents and developers to study and manage archaeological resources important to the community's past.

Alexandria Black History Museum

The Alexandria Black History Museum includes the Museum, the Watson Reading Room, and the Alexandria African American Heritage Park. Other African American historic sites in Alexandria include the <u>Freedom House Museum</u>, the <u>Contrabands and Freedmen Cemetery Memorial</u>, and sites along the <u>African American Heritage Trail</u>.

Alexandria History Museum at The Lyceum

In 1839, the Lyceum Company, which promoted education in Alexandria, partnered with the Alexandria Library Company to build Lyceum Hall. The new building had a library and reading room on the first floor and a large hall on the second floor for lectures, debates, concerts, meetings, and other public programs.

<u>Carlyle House Historic Park</u>: 18th Century Mansion & Gardens

Discover Carlyle House Historic Park, home to an eighteenth-century historic house museum in Old Town Alexandria, Virginia. John Carlyle, a wealthy merchant and a founder of Alexandria, completed his elegant stone mansion in 1753. Today, Carlyle House is one of the nation's finest examples of Georgian residential architecture.

Freedom House Museum

This national historic landmark features three new exhibitions showcasing Alexandria's Black history and the Black experience in America. Learn about the experiences of the enslaved and free Black people who lived in—and were trafficked through—Alexandria, plus stories from the Civil Rights Movement and more.

Gadsby's Tavern Museum

Gadsby's Tavern Museum consists of two buildings, a ca. 1785 tavern and the 1792 City Tavern and Hotel, which hosted the first five U.S. presidents, Barrett Library, the site of one of the nation's earliest civil rights sit-ins and more.

George Mason's Gunston Hall

The 1750s home of Virginia statesman George Mason, featuring Georgian design & 250-year-old shrubs.



George Washington Masonic National Memorial

Neoclassical shrine dedicated to George Washington, with ornate hall, museum & observation deck; This memorial was recently added to the United States government's official list of National Historic Landmarks and National Register of Historic Places.

George Washington's Mount Vernon

George Washington's vast estate, furnished with period pieces & the president's own belongings.

National Inventors Hall of Fame and Museum

The National Inventors Hall of Fame (NIHF) is free and located on the United States Patent and Trademark Office campus in Alexandria, Virginia. It showcases the more than 600 inventors who have been inducted into NIHF and their great technological achievements that helped stimulate growth for our nation and beyond.

Old Town Alexandria

Old Town is a historic district along the Potomac that is chiefly known for its 18th-century townhouses, art galleries, antique shops, and restaurants as well as its unique cobblestone streets and red brick sidewalks. George Washington slept at Gadsby's Tavern, one of the many small museums in the area. Another is Stabler-Leadbeater Apothecary, opened in 1783. Indie boutiques and foodie spots line King Street, and there are open-air eateries by the river. The Saturday farmers' market has been operating for 260 years.

River Farm

The American Horticultural Society headquarters at River Farm is a 25-acre national showcase for gardening and horticultural practices located along the Potomac River.

Stabler-Leadbeater Apothecary Museum

Opened in 1792 by young Quaker pharmacist Edward Stabler, the family business operated until 1933. Patrons included George & Martha Washington. Over 15,000 objects still remain as part of the museum's collection – everything from herbs to bottles.

The Birchmere Music Hall

In music circles, the reputation of the Birchmere is legendary. Many careers have been launched from this internationally recognized music hall. On any given night, a star may be born. Mary Chapin Carpenter, Lyle Lovett, Shawn Colvin, Jerry Jeff Walker, Dave Matthews, Vince Gill, John Prine, Emmylou Harris, Linda Ronstadt, and k.d. Lang are just a few of the artists counted as good friends of the Birchmere.

Torpedo Factory Art Center

Founded in 1974 in an old munitions plant, the Torpedo Factory Art Center is home to the nation's largest collection of working-artists' open studios under one roof.

Woodlawn & Pope-Leighey House

Early-1800s mansion & former plantation with a modest 1940 home designed by Wright in the grounds.
